PART 1 : GENERAL PRESENTATION OF ENIB

1 – THE SCHOOL

- ▶ Founded in Brest in 1961, the École Nationale d'Ingénieurs de Brest (ENIB) is a **graduate school of engineering** and ranks among the highly selective French Grandes Ecoles d'Ingénieurs. It is accredited by the CTI (Commission des titres d'ingénieur) and has received the EUR-ACE European label of quality. General engineering students **complete a 5-year course of study at ENIB** and graduate to careers in **electronics, computer science and mechatronics**.
- ▶ ENIB is renowned for its academic programmes and for the scientific research carried out in its **two research laboratories**, Lab-STICC and IRDL, focusing on the fields of virtual reality, optical communications and adaptive systems.
- ▶ ENIB's **close ties to business** help graduates rapidly find their place in the job market, with 94% of ENIB graduates finding employment within 4 months of their graduation.

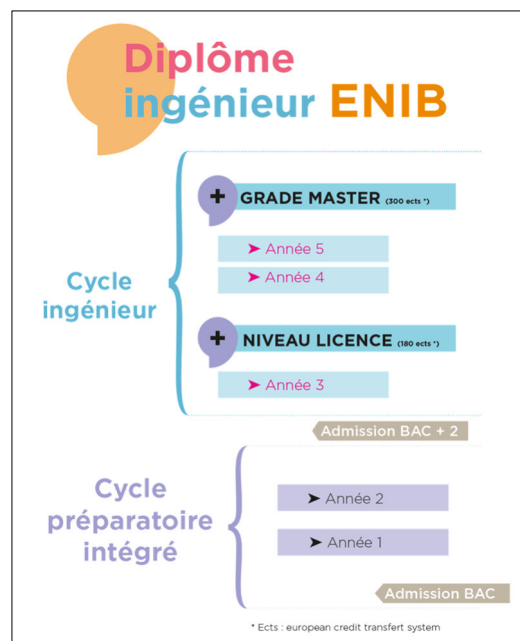


The school is located in the Brest-Iroise Technopôle. This technology cluster brings together engineering schools, research centres and hi-tech firms on a single site.



2 - PROGRAMS

- ▶ ENIB offers training in French, but emphasizes proficiency in English, which is the working language in large companies.
- ▶ Students have the option learning a second language. ENIB offers classes in German, Spanish, Mandarin, Portuguese, and Italian (beginner to advanced level).
- ▶ Non-French-speaking students enrolling ENIB, attend French as a Foreign Language (FLE) class.
- ▶ The ENIB engineering degree is accredited by the Commission des Titres d'Ingénieurs (CTI). Only the programs accredited by the CTI can obtain the title of engineer.



- ▶ ENIB awards an engineering degree (Diplôme d'Ingénieur généraliste, equivalent of a Master of Engineering) in Electronics, Computer Science and Mechatronics. This degree awards a Master degree.
- ▶ Programs are organized into 10 semesters (S1 to S10) and 3 intersessions (IS1 to IS3). Every semester has two sessions (fall and spring). Intersessions occur as breaks between two semesters during the first three years of study.
- ▶ The school also awards 4 Master's degrees (national Master degree recognized by the State) :
 - ✓ Master in Computer Science
 - ✓ Master in Fundamental and Applied Physics: Photonics
 - ✓ Master in Telecommunication
 - ✓ Master in Signal and Telecommunications
 - ✓ Master in Electronics Radiofrequency and Telecommunication
 - ✓ Master in Mechanics, Materials and Civil Engineering

► ENIB also awards PhD degrees in the fields of Engineering Science and Information and Communication Technology and Science (ICTS).

► The national Doctorate degree, recognized by the State and issued by an accredited public institution of higher education, awards the title of Doctor.

3 - THE ENIB CAMPUS

► The ENIB campus is located on the Brest-Iroise Technology Park. It has an exceptional setting (panoramic sea and harbor views).

► 4 main buildings :

- ✓ Building 1 : includes all the administrative offices, technical services, classrooms and project rooms
- ✓ Building 2 : includes library and classrooms
- ✓ Maison des Associations (MDA) : includes students associations and cafeteria
- ✓ The European Center of Virtual Reality (CERV) : located on Claude Chappe street

► The Kernevent Community Restaurant (RAK)

The RAK is open to students of the Brest-Iroise Technology Park. It is located near IMT Atlantique.

► Digital center (PNBI)

ENIB has access to the shared facility called PNBI, at the Brest Iroise Technology park. It includes a 150-seat digital auditorium, a telepresence room and conventional conference rooms.

► High-performance equipment

Students are trained on the same industrial equipment they will use in a workplace.

► The school has auditoriums, videoconference rooms, a documentation resource center, a language lab, and computer labs accessible during extended hours. Several rooms are reserved for teamwork or individual project work.

► **ENIB is located in Plouzané, near Brest.** The campus location should be taken into consideration when looking for accomodation, depending on whether you prefer to live in the city or nearby. The campus is also accessible by public transportation.

► Regarding registration fees, students from institutions that have a partnership with ENIB are EXEMPT from registration fees ONLY if they present a certificate of enrollment from their home institution.



3 - VISA

The official website for visa application to France is : <https://france-visas.gouv.fr/web/france-visas/accueil>

✓ STEP 1 > Request for a visa (before arrival)

Students **from the EU or the EEC** require only their national identity card or passport to enter France. These documents must be valid for the entire length of your stay.

Students from **outside the EU or EEC** must apply for a VLS-TS (a long-stay visa valid as a student residence permit) or, for those staying less than 3 months, a short-stay visa.

Visa requests must be made through Campus France (Études en France procedure). You must complete an online request that will then be validated by ENIB. To learn more about the Études en France procedure, visit the Campus France website and see the section relevant to your home country:

✓ STEP 2 > Validation of your visa (immediately upon arrival)

Upon arrival in France, and within a maximum of three months, students must quickly validate their residence permit online. To do so, they must:

1 – Go to ANEF platform : <https://administration-etrangers-en-france.interieur.gouv.fr/>

2 – Have the following documents ready :

- ✓ Valid email address
- ✓ A passport and visa
- ✓ A residential address in France
- ✓ A credit card to pay the residence permit issuance fee. (If you do not have a credit card, you can purchase an electronic stamp at a tobacco shop).

3 - Download the VLS-TS validation confirmation : Students can also download it by logging into their personal account or via the confirmation email that will be sent to them. This document will serve as proof that you have completed the process and are in good standing (as a residence permit holder). It will allow you to travel, complete various formalities (CAF, Social Security, etc.), and renew your residence permit at a later date.

4 - If you have any difficulties with the visa application process, we strongly recommend that you contact the Centre de Mobilité Internationale (CMI), which would assist you with this process.

Please note: do not contact the Brest sub-prefecture directly. The CMI will be able to help you first!

4 - HOUSING

Finding affordable housing takes time, and it can be difficult to find something at the start of the academic year. **That's why, we strongly recommend that you start looking for housing before your arrival.**

In Brest, there are several options for finding housing.

- ✓ Housing reserved for students and managed by the Centre National des Œuvres Universitaires et Scolaires (CROUS)
- ✓ Private student residences
- ✓ Private housing
- ✓ Homestay (roommate)

In France, housing is described as : studio, T1, T2, T3, T1 BIS, etc.

- ✓ The number indicates the number of rooms, excluding the bathroom and toilet (WC).
- ✓ "Bis" means that one of the rooms is larger than the others, or can be divided into two separate spaces.

► CROUS University residence

MONTHLY RENT : approximately €256

Housing costs (water, electricity, internet, etc.) are included. These residences are affordable and located close to the city center. There are three CROUS university residences in Brest (Kergoat, Bouguen, Lanrédec):

which offer two types of rooms:

- ✓ Standard room (9m²) : shared bathroom, shared kitchen, sink in the room
- ✓ Renovated room (9m²) : private bathroom, toilet and sink, refrigerator, shared kitchen

To reserve a student room in a CROUS university residence, a housing application form will be sent to you by email upon your admission by the ENIB International Relations office.

PLEASE NOTE: the number of rooms at CROUS residences is limited.

► Private student residence KER STUDY (Les Amitiés d'Armor)

MONTHLY FEE : from €278

A welcoming, contemporary student residence for students and young professionals, located in the heart of the Brest-Iroise Technology Park in Plouzané (a 5-minute walk from ENIB). Designed to combine independence, community living, and modern comforts, it opened its doors in August 2025. ► Private student residence ARPEJ

MONTHLY FEE : from €330

Housing costs (water, electricity, internet, etc.) are included. Choice of shared accommodation for 2-3 people.

There are two in the center of Brest

Résidence Recouvrance

Résidence Liberté

Reservations can be made online on the website of the residence of your choice. Then click on the orange **BOOK** button > choose the start month (ex. January) > select the accommodation you are interested in.

► Private student residence Les Belles Années

MONTHLY FEE : from €440

The R'CAMPUS residence is located in Dupuy-de-Lôme, in the center of Brest, close to tram stops. It offers furnished studio or one-bedroom apartments. All apartments have a kitchenette, a sleeping area, a desk, a bathroom with shower, and a private toilet. Please note that electricity charge is not included in the price of the apartment.

► Private student residence UXCO

MONTHLY FEE : from €490

The Lemon residence is located in the Capucins district, close to the historic center of Recouvrance. It offers shared studio to two-bedroom apartments, each equipped with a kitchenette, a sleeping area, a desk area with storage space, and a bathroom with shower and private toilet.

The rent includes furnished accommodation, a linen kit, common charges, hot and cold water, and heating. For shared rooms, electricity is included in the rent.

► Private housing (apartment, studio, sharing)

MONTHLY FEE : approximately €250-400

You can rent an apartment by dealing directly with the owner. Apartments can be rented unfurnished, furnished, or fully equipped. You will need to pay rental charges (water, electricity, etc.).

Be careful of scams: ads on private websites that are not verified. Make sure you do not make any bank transfers before visiting the apartment and signing a lease/rental agreement.

Shared accommodation is one of the most economical solutions. By sharing an apartment or house with other students, you can split the rent and utilities.

► Rental agreement (lease)

The lease is the contract between the tenant and the landlord. The minimum lease term varies depending on the property. This document specifies all the details of the rental (term, payment, charges, description of the property, amount of the security deposit). It is written and mandatory. It must be read and signed by both parties. The first month's rent must be paid upon signing the lease.

► Security deposit

The security deposit is a guarantee deposit. It is usually equivalent to one month's rent. It will be refunded to you if the property is in good condition at the end of the lease. Rent must be paid at the beginning of each month. Other conditions may apply depending on the residence.

► VISALE guarantee

When renting accommodation in France, a guarantor is required. This is an individual or organization that will act as a guarantor for the payment of your rent. In most cases, foreign guarantors are not accepted. If you do not know anyone in France who can act as your guarantor, you can use VISALE rental guarantees.

Intended for students aged **18 to 30 with no income requirements, this free rental** guarantee covers all types of housing (unpaid rent, rental damage). You can check your eligibility on the website

www.visale.fr

► Housing allowance

All students can apply for financial assistance to help pay for their housing through the Family Allowance Fund (Caisse d'Allocations Familiales/CAF). This assistance is called Personalized Housing Assistance (Aide Personnalisée au Logement/APL) and will be deducted from your rent. Sometimes, the residences where you are staying can help you, put together your application.

Simply submit your application as soon as you receive your lease. You will need to open a bank account before and have your bank account details (RIB), and proof of identity, such as a residence permit: <https://caf.fr/allocataires/caf-du-var/offre-de-service/logement/je-suis-etudiant-etou-apprenti/je-suis-etudiant-etranger>

APL can significantly reduce your rental costs. It is calculated based on your rent and your financial resources.

Examples of APL (may vary depending on individual situation) :

	Example Monthly rent	Example APL
Room CROUS	€256	€36
Room ARPEJ	€340	€92
Private housing	€350	€150

► Housing insurance

In France, it is mandatory to insure your accommodation, whether it is a room in a university residence or a private rental.

Home insurance provides financial coverage for a wide range of damage that may occur in your home (flooding, fire, electrical damage). It covers not only the building and the apartment, but also the furniture; the occupants of the home at the time of the incident, and their civil liability. This is a multi-risk home insurance.

“Tenant liability insurance” is a home insurance policy that can be taken out with your bank or a private insurer (ADH student insurance, SMEBA, LMDE, etc.). It is often possible to take out a policy online.

All incoming students are required to take out **civil liability insurance** in their country or in France for physical injury caused to third parties in their private life and for property damage. This insurance must cover you in France for the entire duration of your stay.

5 – HOW TO GET TO BREST ?

► By plane

Brest Airport is located approximately 10 km from Brest, in Guipavas. A shuttle bus runs regularly between the airport and the Porte de Guipavas tram stop, connecting with tram line A.

► By train

There is a high-speed train (TGV) service between Paris (Gare Montparnasse) and Brest. There is also a service between Paris and Charles de Gaulle Airport (five trips per day with a change in Rennes), then Rennes and Brest.

► By bus

► By car

There is a carpooling platform called “Blablacar” that allows you to travel at a reduced cost. <https://www.blablacar.fr/>

► PICK-UP SERVICE

On the day of your arrival in Brest (airport or train station), you can be picked up, by a student volunteer who will take you to your accommodation. This same person will be available to help you with the initial steps upon your arrival, if necessary.

This service is free of charge and is provided by the Centre de Mobilité Internationale (CMI) in Brest.

► HOW TO GET AROUND BREST ?

► By public transportation

Public transport in Brest is organized into a transport network called Bibus. <https://www.bibus.fr/>

Bibus includes a tram line, a cable car line, and 29 bus lines.

Tickets can be purchased at the Bibus office located at 33 avenue Clémenceau in Brest, or via the Bibus app. The app allows you to plan your journeys (itinerary, online ticket purchase, line schedules, real-time network traffic information). <https://www.bibus.fr/bibus-et-vous/application-bibus>

► How to access ENIB

ENIB is not located in the city of Brest, but in Plouzané. From Brest city center, you can choose one of the following routes :

- ✓ From the city center « Place de la Liberté »

Take tram A from the **Liberté** station towards **Porte de Plouzané (Brest)** > Get off at the Porte de Plouzané station > Take **line 02** towards **Technopôle** > Get off at the **Écoles** stop.

OR

Take **line 02** from the **Liberté Quartz** station towards **Technopôle** > Get off at the **Écoles** stop.

- ✓ From the SNCF train station

Take **line 02** from the **Kennedy Gare station** towards **Technopôle** > Get off at the **Écoles** stop.

Line 11 serves the center of Plouzané and the Brest-Iroise Technopôle.

► By bike

Vélocibus

Bibus also offers a long-term electric bike rental service called Vélocibus. Online reservations : <https://www.bibus.fr/services/velocibus>

VéloZef

VéloZef is the name of Brest Métropole's self-service electric bike service. VéloZef complements the Bibus transport service and allows residents of the metropolitan area to enjoy a 100% electric bike rental service, ideal for short distances or short trips.

185 high-performance bikes (with a range of up to 60 km on a full charge) that are easy to handle, lightweight, and simple to use;

29 fixed stations for charging, picking up, and dropping off bikes, located throughout the metropolitan area in Brest, Plouzané, and Le Relecq-Kerhuon. (***one station available in front of IMT Atlantique**)

Reduced subscription fee of €6 per month (instead of €10) for students and those under 26 years of age for an unlimited number of trips of less than 15 minutes. Trips lasting longer than 15 minutes will cost €1 per 15 minutes or part thereof.

► Brest is a city with an affordable cost of living. To help you plan your budget, below is an estimate of the main expenses (data provided for informational purposes only).

7 - DISABILITY

► The ENIB buildings meet PMR (people with reduced mobility) standards and have adapted toilets (WC), reserved parking spaces, exterior floor markings for the visually impaired, adapted stairs as well as access ramps and elevators.



8 – INTERNATIONAL STUDENTS MENTORS



- ▶ The International Relations office, in collaboration with the Bureau des Etudiants (BDE), has set up a mentoring program for newly arrived international students. The aim of this program, called **ENIBuddy**, is to enable international students to get in touch with ENIB students **BEFORE THEY ARRIVE IN BREST**.
- ▶ These ENIBuddy student volunteers (mentors) are familiar with the school, the city of Brest, and its surroundings. They can therefore help new arrivals settle into their new life and integrate into ENIB. Throughout the year, the ENIBuddy program also offers opportunities for French and international students to meet, and discover the city of Brest and its region.
- ▶ Your ENIBuddy will contact you directly, and you can ask them any practical questions you may have (advice on housing, school life, going out, life in Brest and France, etc.).



PART 3 : FORMALITIES UPON ARRIVAL

1 - VISA

► Validation of visa (immediately upon arrival)

When you arrive in France, you must validate your residence permit as soon as possible, within three months : <https://administration-etrangers-en-france.interieur.gouv.fr/> (see part 2, section 3 - VISA)

This will generate a document called “Confirmation validation VLS,” which will be proof that you now have a residence permit. It will allow you to travel, complete various formalities (CAF, Social Security, etc.), and subsequently renew your residence permit.

3 – HEALTH INSURANCE (SOCIAL SECURITY)

Health insurance (Social Security) is mandatory for all higher education students.

Why ? To be reimbursed for part of your healthcare costs (70%) (doctor's appointments, medical exams, etc.).

When ? As soon as possible after enrolling in a higher education institution.

How ? By visiting the website <https://etudiant-etranger.ameli.fr>, available in French and English.

How much ? It's free. Both French and foreign students do not pay to register with the French social security system.

► European students

If you are a citizen of the European Union/European Economic Area or Switzerland, before you leave, you must obtain a European Health Insurance Card (EHIC) from your health insurance provider in your country of origin.

► Non-European students

You must be affiliated with the general social security system, with some exceptions.



Special cases (not mandatory)

- > Quebec students with a RAMQ certificate
- > Students staying for less than 90 days are not considered residents and must purchase private health insurance translated into French or English, including repatriation coverage valid for the entire duration of their stay.

► Supplementary insurance

In addition to health insurance, you can take out supplementary insurance, known as “mutuelle,” which will supplement your health insurance reimbursements. These mutual insurance plans are paid for and are not mandatory. Depending on your residence and income, you can apply for CMU-C (complementary universal health coverage), which is free of charge. Taking out supplementary insurance is strongly recommended, as it provides better reimbursement for routine healthcare costs.

► Service Universitaire de Médecine Préventive et de Promotion de la Santé (SUMPPS)

ENIB students have access to the SUMPPS at the University of Western Brittany (UBO). It offers medical, psychological, and social support. This service also keeps students informed about their health rights and guides them in accessing healthcare.

4 – OPENING A BANK ACCOUNT

- ▶ It is strongly recommended that you open a bank account upon your arrival in France. This will enable you to receive your housing assistance, health insurance reimbursements, and make everyday purchases, among other things.
- ▶ To open a bank account, simply go to a bank and make an appointment with an advisor.
- ▶ When opening a bank account in France, be sure to bring :
 - ✓ Proof of identity (ID card, passport)
 - ✓ A residence permit
 - ✓ Proof of address: this is a document showing your home address
- ▶ On the day you open your account, you will need to deposit a sum of money (which varies depending on the bank's conditions) into your account.

5 – FRENCH PHONE NUMBER

- ▶ It is recommended to get a phone number upon arrival in France.
- ▶ You can order a SIM card online or purchase it in a store of your choice. There are several carriers in Brest, such as Free, SFR, Orange, Bouygues, etc.
- ▶ Don't forget to provide your French phone number to the service Scolarité of ENIB !

PART 4 : USEFUL INFORMATION

1 – INTEGRATION WEEK

- ▶ ENIB offers a Special Welcome to new international students.
- ▶ Orientation Week generally takes place at the end of august. Participation is mandatory and completely free.
- ▶ Information sessions are usually scheduled to familiarize you with the practical aspects, and administrative formalities upon your arrival (CAF, visa, Social Security, opening a bank account, etc.). The Centre de mobilité internationale (CMI) will also give a presentation.
- ▶ The International Relations office (RI) and the Bureau des étudiants (BDE) jointly organize events at special times throughout the year (ENIBuddies Evening, Boat Trip, Small World, etc.).



Each year, ENIB organizes a multicultural event, the **Small World**, to celebrate all the world cultures present at ENIB. If you want, you could bring your best recipes of your country, objects, traditional costumes, posters, flags ...etc., to represent your country or your region !



2 – BACK TO SCHOOL DAY

- ▶ A back-to-school program will be sent to you by email, with information about your welcome day and its schedule.
- ▶ Time slots will be set for photos, student ID, information about IT, a tour of the school, and more.

3 – WELCOME PACK

- ▶ During the Back to school day, a **WELCOME PACK** will be offered to each new international student, including :
 - ✓ 1 x 3 days pass, for the public transportation (Bibus)
 - ✓ 1 prepaid SIM card (€7,50 credit)

4 – FRENCH AS A FOREIGN LANGUAGE (FLE)

► Non French speaking students enrolling at ENIB can attend French as a Foreign Language (FLE) classes during their studies at ENIB. Upon arrival, students take a test to determine their level of French and the class they can take.

- ✓ FLE 1 : course to progress to the intermediate level of French, developing grammar skills and expanding vocabulary (B1)
- ✓ FLE 2 : course for intermediate level to improve formal written and spoken French (B2/B2+)
- ✓ FLE 3 : course for advanced level for DALF exam (C1/C2)

5 - CATERING

RAK

► ENIB students can eat at the Kernevent students restaurant (RAK). The restaurant is located a 5-minute walk from the school, right next to IMT Atlantique.

► To eat at the RAK, you must add credit to your student card. A link will be sent to you by email after you have completed your administrative registration, so that you can add credit to your student card.

► No credit card or cash payments are accepted.

► Opening hours:

Please note that there are set opening hours for eating at the RAK, which must be respected. There are two possible time slots for ENIB students:

6 – CLASS SCHEDULE

7 - LIBRARY

- ▶ The Pôle Documentaire en Ingénierie (PDI) is located in the ENIB 2 Building, Entrance A. It brings together the documentary collections of Bretagne INP, ENIB and ESIAB. As a partner of the UBO Joint Documentation Service, it is part of the Brest University Libraries network.
- ▶ The ENIB Library (also known as the PDI) is accessible to students and staff. It primarily offers documentation related to the school's teaching disciplines, as well as a general knowledge collection (newspapers, novels, preparation for administrative exams, etc.). It develops collections to support language learning in order to support and facilitate students' international mobility.

9 – STUDENT LIFE AT ENIB

- ▶ The Student Union (BDE) is a student association, run by students, for students. This organization is the hub of ENIB student groups, and sets the pace for the daily life and extracurricular activities at the school.
- ▶ The BDE manages all extracurricular activities offered to students: sporting events, parties, galas, and festive welcome weekends (welcoming new students). It runs the Student House (Maison des étudiants) and the Student Hall (Foyer des élèves), and coordinates all clubs, as they report directly to the BDE.
- ▶ ENIB is fortunate to enjoy a very rich community life. Seven student associations and nearly 25 clubs revolve around the BDE, offering a variety of sports, cultural, recreational, and artistic activities: games, wine tasting, music, photography, video, etc.
- ▶ The BDE's International Club is dedicated to international students. Its mission is to help them integrate through various activities: ENIBuddies; Integration week; Organization of events

10 - SPORTS AT ENIB

- ▶ Le Bureau Des Sports (BDS) offers a variety of sports throughout the year : rugby, soccer, volleyball, badminton, basketball, diving, sailing, surfing and other board sports.
- ▶ Le BDE provides foosball tables, a pool table, an arcade machine, and snacks ... making it as a welcoming place.
